
Fleet Information

- The company has firmed up damp-lease agreements for 19 aircraft scheduled to join the fleet between October and November 2025. Fourteen are already in operation, and the recent return of a reactivated Boeing 737 MAX takes the total additions so far to 15. This marks a clear step forward in SpiceJet's capacity build-up for the coming year.
- SpiceJet aims to bring up to eight of its grounded Boeing aircraft back into service by April 2026, including four in the early winter period to meet peak travel demand. Two have already rejoined the fleet, upto two more ungrounded and inducted into the fleet by December 2025, and the remaining four are planned to return by early summer 2026.
- By the end of 2025, SpiceJet aims to double its operational fleet and nearly triple its Available Seat Kilometers (ASKM)

By the end of 2025, SpiceJet aims to more than double its capacity and nearly triple its ASKM by end of 2025, marking a significant milestone in its growth journey.




Operational & Strategic Milestones

- Carlyle Settlement: Successfully settled with Carlyle Aviation Partners, unlocking USD 79.6 million in cash maintenance reserves and USD 9.9 million in credits toward lease obligations boosting liquidity and supporting fleet revival efforts
- Credit Suisse Settlement: Completed full payment of USD 24 million to Credit Suisse, further strengthening SpiceJet's balance sheet and reinforcing its commitment to legacy liability resolution
- Crisil A4+: Assigned by CRISIL Ratings Limited, recognizing SpiceJet's capital-raising ability, improved liquidity, and ongoing financial restructuring efforts
- Acuité BB (Stable): Upgraded from BB– (Stable); short-term rating reaffirmed at A4+, reflecting improved credit profile, stronger liquidity, and financial discipline
- Network and Market Expansion: SpiceJet is set to operate 225 daily flights during the Winter Schedule 2025 a sharp increase from 125 daily flights in the preceding Summer Schedule and 150 daily flights during the last winter season.

Outlook for the Upcoming Quarters

- Operational fleet expected to double by end-2025, driving a sharp expansion in network reach and scale.
- ASKM projected to rise nearly threefold, supporting a triple digit revenue growth for the next quarter
- Higher capacity and better aircraft utilisation expected to materially improve CASK and lift overall profitability.
- Liability restructuring remains an ongoing process and significant liability is expected to be restructured in Q3 and Q4, thereby strengthening the balance sheet
